Wales Coast Path

The Wales Coast Path has made it easier than ever to explore the nation's wonderful coastline.

In Monmouthshire you can enjoy the trail in short sections or walk the whole 14 mile (22km) length. It's mostly level going other than a few steeper parts in Chepstow. Boots and warm, waterproof clothing are advised.

Join the route at Chepstow, Black Rock, Sudbrook or Caldicot for walks with good links to public transport. At Mathern, resting place of the King of Gwent, Wales Coast Path meets the Tewdring Trail.

Accessibility

The Path is accessible for mobility buggies within Chepstow town and on sections between Black Rock and Sudbrook, Sudbrook and the M4 and across the Rogiet Moors. Full mobility gates are installed throughout the Monmouthshire stretch, the only exception being one stile at Image Farm, Mathern.

Horse riding and cycling

There is a short section of bridleway linking Sudbrook village with Black Rock picnic site. Horse riding and cycling are also permitted on the Restricted Byways of the Rogiet Moors.



You'll find a variety of shops and services in Magor, Caldicot and Chepstow. The Tourist Information Centre by Chepstow castle is a good starting point for your visit, providing plenty of advice on coastal places to visit, eat, drink and stay.

There's a strong sense of history here. Look out for Caldicot's Medieval castle and country park, the sea defences of the Gwent Levels, Chepstow heritage trail and castle, Black Rock's lave net fishing and Victorian engineering at Sudbrook.

With the second highest tidal range on the planet, this coast is both natural wonder and special habitat. Every year thousands of migrating birds are attracted to the abundant feeding grounds of the mudflats.

This threshold of Wales has been a strategic place to cross the Severn Estuary since Roman times. Today's magnificent bridges are part of a breathtaking seascape, easily enjoyed at Black Rock viewpoint and picnic site.

Along Monmouthshire's coastline, you'll discover natural splendour, fascinating traditions and panoramic views.

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
Home of Welsh castle life
