Visitor Attractions & Points of Interest

1 The Deep
Experience the dramatic story of the world's oceans, from the dawn of time and into the future at Hull's award-winning submarine; home to 40 sharks and 3500 fish! Europe's deepest viewing tunnel and new for 2009, Lost Oceans' featuring 3D film Monsters of The Deep
Daily 10am - 6pm (last admission 5pm)

2 Maister House
This Georgian merchant's house located in Hull was rebuilt in 1743, with superb staircase and hall in the Palladian manner acting as an impressive symbol of Hull's 18th-century heyday
Mon - Fri 9am - 4pm (staircase and hall only)

3 Hull & East Riding Museum
From majestic mammoths to Saxon invaders, visitors can look forward to an experience that is unique, educational and - above all - fun. Displays show just what life was like and how people used to live. Some of the most spectacular natural history and archaeology displays in Britain.

4 Streetlife Museum of Transport
Award winning! Climb aboard an old corporation tram, experience a bone-shaking ride on the simulated mail coach (pneumatically) of a steam locomotive goods station. Then there's the motor car gallery, the bicycle gallery, the toy displays and the old shop.

5 Arctic Corsair
Real trawlersmen share their experiences on board the 1960s sidewinder trawler permanently berthed on the River Hull. A veteran of the Cod Wars, the Arctic Corsair was rammed by an Icelandic gun boat in the 1970s.
April - October: Weds and Sat 10am - 4.30pm and Sun 1.30pm - 4.30pm
(Closed - October to March, Good Friday)

6 Wilberforce House
The birthplace and residence of William Wilberforce, the 19th century Hull MP, who campaigned for the abolition of slavery in the British Empire. The house has recently undergone a multi-million pound refurbishment. Group/school bookings please telephone the general office on 01482 613902

7 Blades House
This former Georgian residence was home to and business headquarters of the Blades family, which was engaged in shipbuilding. Today it houses the University of Hull's Maritime Historical Studies Centre.

8 Bounty Dry Dock
This is where the Blades built the c400 tons Bethia launched in 1782. After five years deployed in the Baltic timber trade she was acquired by the Admiralty and renamed HM Armed Vessel Bounty.

9 Wilberforce Monument
The monument to William Wilberforce is 102 feet high in total, carved out of hard-wearing millstone grit.
It was originally erected next to Princes Quay Dock in 1834.

10 St Mary the Virgin, Lowgate
This early 14th century medieval church is amongst Hull's oldest churches and boasts 16th century Harrison Brass, 15th century glass in the East Window and several 19th century memorials of famous Hull people. Tower visits give stunning views of the Humber estuary and across Hull.

11 Holy Trinity Church
Largest parish church (by area) in England. The earliest brick built building still used for its original purpose; dates from end of the 13th century, although most of the fittings are Victorian. Impressive stained glass windows and Thomas Earle sculptured marble memorials.
12pm - 3pm, Weds - Fri 12pm - 3pm, Sat 9.30am - 12pm

12 Hands on History Museum
A great way for kids (and parents!) to get involved with history. An interactive exhibition which examines aspects of Victorian Britain: the Story of Hull and its People, and Ancient Egypt - life and death, including tomb furniture and the mummy of an ancient Egyptian priest.

13 Maritime Museum
Hull dominated the Arctic whaling trade in the early nineteenth century - an outstanding collection of whaling artefacts including whale skeletons, tools and weapons. There are fine contemporary paintings of the ships and the largest collection of scrimshaw on this side of the Atlantic.

14 Ferens Art Gallery
One of the finest provincial art galleries in the country; important works by Frans Hals, Antonio Canaletto, Henry Moore, David Hockney and Helen Chadwick. The innovative Children's Gallery brings art to life for young enquiring minds.

15 Spurn Light Ship
Built in 1927, the 'Spurn' served for almost 50 years as a navigational aid in the treacherous River Humber. See how the crew lived and worked and learn more about her valuable role and the work of the Humber Conservancy Board.
Currently closed for refurbishment

16 Dinostar
Exhibition includes a full sized T-rex skull, Triceratops leg bones you can touch and feel and a unique dinosaur sound box.
Open 11am - 5.00pm Sundays plus school holidays

17 Victoria Pier
Originally the landing for the ferry across the Humber, Victoria Pier is the best place to view The Deep and has commanding views of the Estuary. Try the telescope! With Pole and Voyage, a commemorative statue to trading links with Iceland.

- Central Line**
This is the primary route across the city centre from the train and bus station in the west to The Deep 'submarium' on the east bank of the River Hull: **20-25 minutes walk.**
- Discovery Line**
This circular route around Hull's historic Old Town is anchored at the Tourist Information Centre under the City Hall in Queen Victoria Square, but can be joined anywhere. A great way of taking in the top tourist attractions. **Around an hour's walk non-stop.**
- Waterfront Line**
Runs from The Deep in the east, along the Humber waterfront, taking in the Marina to the new Humber Quays plaza in front of Wellington Street West. **About 15-20 minutes non-stop.**
- Brook Street Line**
This northern loop links with the Central Line and includes St Stephen's and Prospect Shopping Centres, as well as major stores and specialist retailers.
- River Hull Boardwalk**
This riverside alternative of the Discovery Line takes in open views across the River Hull. A ten minute detour well worth taking. Parts closed for improvements during 2010.
- Bridge**
A unique bridge over the river being built in 2009, due to open early 2010, complete with themed artwork and sound feature.
