

4 Wroxham Barns

Shops, crafts, cafe, craft exhibitions and demonstrations, children's play area. Toilets. Entrance fee to children's farm

3 Hoveton/Wroxham

This once tiny village has grown, mostly as a result of tourism. There are shops, cafes, pubs and a Broads Information Centre. For the steam rail enthusiasts, the Bure Valley Light Railway is just beyond the rail bridge on the right. Visit the Riverside Park on the right near the Broads Information Centre.

2 Hoveton Hall Gardens

Beautiful woodlands and walled gardens, including woodland and lakeside walks.

5 St Swithins Ashmanhaugh

Parts of this round towered church are medieval, for example the carved pew ends known as "poppy-heads".

6 St Michaels & All Angels Church

Although this medieval church is kept locked, the outside is interesting too. Look for the Lych gate - where coffins waited before being summoned into the church.

7 Barton Turf

The village sign features a wherry - a traditional sailing-trading barge. The staithe has views of the river and a short walk, through part of the nature reserve, to some moorings. From the moorings you look across to the "Heater". This floating island is so called due to its shape - an old heating iron!

8 Solar Boat

"Ra" - Trips available around Barton Broad.

9 Barton Broad

The second largest broad and site of the Broads Authority's millennium project which has restored the water quality and landscape of the broad. According to local legend, Lord Nelson learned to sail here while staying at the Vicarage - now a hotel. There is a car park and toilets close to the Barton Angler PH. On the boardwalk you will be able to go right into the mysterious floating forest of Heron's Carr and have good views over Barton Broad. The boardwalk is due to open Easter 2003. Lock your bikes up at the entrance.

10 Irstead Church & Irstead Shoals Staithe

The church has one of the oldest rood screens in Norfolk. From the staithe enjoy views of the River Ant and Shoals Dykes. Return a little way back up the road to enjoy views south across Hall Marshes. To help maintain the wetland habitat, Broads Authority Conservation teams have been clearing invading scrub from the area. This will help to protect the rich variety of plants and animals which like the wet conditions here.

11 RAF Air Defence Radar Museum

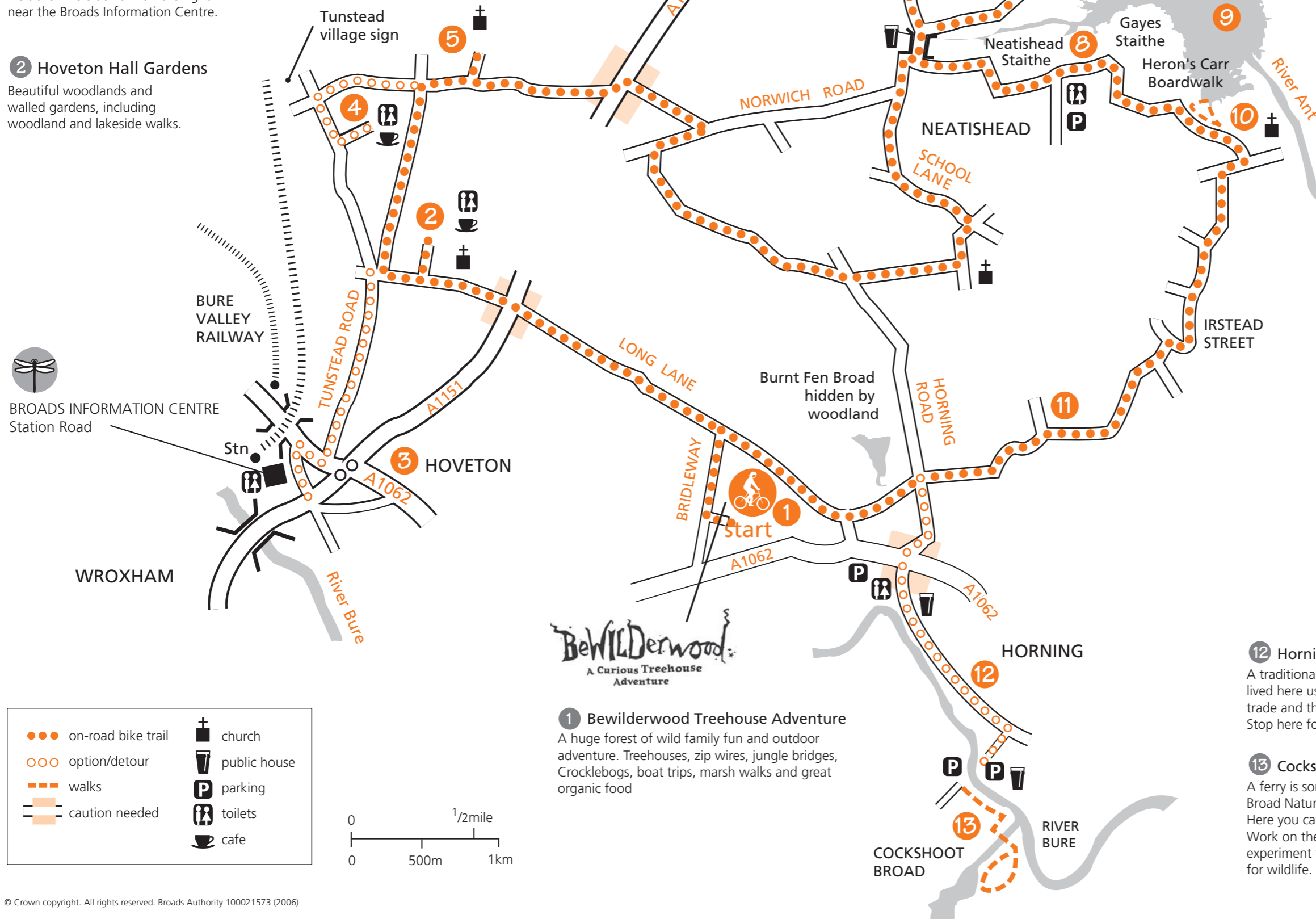
Varied displays showing the history and development of the Radar.

12 Horning

A traditional Broadland village, the people who lived here used to make their living from river trade and the products of the fens and marshes. Stop here for shops and river views.

13 Cockshoot Broad & Nature Trail

A ferry is sometimes available to visit Cockshoot Broad Nature Trail across the River Bure. Here you can enjoy the peace away from the roads. Work on the broad and dyke are part of an experiment to improve water quality and habitat for wildlife.
